Lava lamps

Water is heavier than oil so it will always sink to the bottom, but add a effervescent element like berocca and watch the water bubbles rise and fall.

This activity can be done in almost any size bottle. It can be a great way to recycle waste.

Crystals usually form naturally when liquids cool and start to harden and this experiment is no different.

Dissolved borax in water, when heated then slowly cooled with a pipe cleaner to attach to, will create an awesome crystal.

These crystals will take the form of the pipe cleaner used, so if you make a letter or shape then you will get custom creative crystal.
